Remembering Heroes

One hundred years ago, on 7 December 1905, dedication ceremonies were conducted for the Pennsylvania memorial erected by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in the National Cemetery at Andersonville, Georgia.

On 7 December 2005, the 100th Anniversary Commemoration of that historical event was held. The focus was on honoring all 4,987 of the Pennsylvania Civil War

Veterans who were imprisoned in the Andersonville Prison; of which 1,849 would die there. The rededication was organized by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Department of Pennsylvania, Gettysburg Camp #112.

There was a "March of Honor," from Providence Spring, adjacent to the original North Gate entry to the

stockade and continued approximately 3/8 miles to the Pennsylvania Monument. Participants carried one or more small Pennsylvania state flags. Each flag carried the name of each of the approximately 200 Pennsylvania regiments represented.

As some of the participants gathered to make the march, the glimpse of their reflections could be seen on the surface of

the quiet pool of water originating from the spring. That same source would have sustained life for a number of our ancestors 141 years ago. According to record, perhaps by divine intervention, that water came to the surface during a lightning strike to that site on August 16, 1864.

Anderson Medal commemorates history relived

On December 7, 1905 the Pennsylvania Department of the Grand Army of the Republic traveled to Andersonville, GA to dedicate a monument erected to their comrades who were imprisoned there during the bloodiest four years of this Nation's history.

On December 7, 2005, 100 years later, the Pennsylvania Department Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War along with the other Allied Orders from Pennsylvania rededicated this statue at the National Cemetery in Andersonville, GA.

To commemorate this venerable centennial occasion the Department of Pennsylvania Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War commissioned a limited strike badge and published a commemorative book that contains the names of all those from the Commonwealth known to be imprisoned there. These Badges and books are now available for

purchase by the members of the Sons and other Allied Orders and will be sold as a set.

The Badge is a .999 sterling silver drop suspended on a red Departmental ribbon. All badges are sequentially numbered and were limited to only 300 badges. There is a limited quantity still available. Badge number one was presented to the National Park at Andersonville, with two through nine available for silent bid at a future date.

Members interested in purchasing a commemorative set of the badge and book may now do so. **There is a limit of one badge per person.** The cost of the set is \$25.00 with an additional \$5.00 shipping and handling fee per badge. **Checks should be made payable to the Pennsylvania Department SUVCW.**

Appomattox Banquet to feature One Man Act GAR Remembrance Day in Scranton

Lt. Ezra Griffin Camp #8, SUVCW, Auxiliary #10 and the Delaney Delacy Guard, SVR, will observe its second annual GAR Remembrance Day Saturday, April 22, 2006 in Scranton.

A highlight of the day-long itinerary will be the annual Appomattox Luncheon at the Historic Radisson at Lackawanna Station at noon.

The day will get underway with a GAR Prayer Service by the Central Scranton Ministerium at the Elm Park United Methodist Church, located one half block from the hotel.

A feature of this year's Appomattox Luncheon will be a one-man play, "Witness at Appomattox" written by 1Lt. Alan Sweeney of the Delaney Delacy Guard.

The cost of the luncheon is \$25 per person. Checks should be mailed to Joseph Long Jr., U.S.M.C., Ret., 505 Marcy St. Duryea, PA 18642. Please mark Appomattox Day Luncheon on the check.

Immediately following the luncheon, a benefit Civil War band concert and Ballroom Dance Exhibition will be conducted by the SVR in the main theatre of the Scranton High School. The event will feature the 28th Pennsylvania Regimental Brass Band of

Philadelphia. Tickets will be \$5 and will benefit the Delaney Delacy Youth Fife and Drum Corps.

It will be back to the Radisson later that day, for a pre ball banquet. The banquet will begin at 6 p.m.

The second annual Grand Civil War Ball will commence at 8 p.m. in the Century Club, 612 Jefferson Avenue in Scranton. Music will be by the 28th Pennsylvania Regimental Brass Band of Philadelphia. The event was sold out last year. Tickets will not be sold at the door. Formal dress for both men and ladies is required. Period dress and dress blues greatly admired but not required. The cost is \$70 per couple. Visit the website listed below for more information on tickets.

The Camps Report . . . Camp #8, Scranton

Camp 8 enrollment tops the state in 2005

2005 saw much activity at the camp, including ceremonies to rededicate the refurbished Philip Sheridan Monument and a major increase in the camp compliment making it the largest camp in the commonwealth.

The Sheridan monument was refurbished with funding from the Sons of Union Veterans, the Lackawanna Historical Society and private contributions from the community.

The effort was spearheaded by First Lt. Alan Sweeney of the Delaney Delacy Guard, Sons of Veterans Reserve of Scranton. Lt. Sweeney is a member of Camp #8 and serves as president of the Historical Society as well.

Later that evening the SVR hosted what has become the annual Civil War Ball at the historic Century Club in Scranton's Hill Section. The affair was a sell-out and music was provided by the 28th Regimental Brass Band of Philadelphia.

The 105th annual observance of Memorial Day at the Dunmore Cemetery attracted larger crowds than usual with the appearance of Scranton native and present Pennsylvania Treasurer Bob Casey. Casey, who is running for the U.S. Senate this year, and is a member of Camp

#8 served as guest speaker at the observance. Also on Memorial Day, the SVR was successful in bringing back to life a 50-foot flag pole at the soldiers plot of Forest Hills Cemetery, also in Dunmore. With the assistance of the Dunmore Fire Bureau, new hardware was installed and Old Glory was once again flying above the graves of our ancestors.

Camp #8 in June had the honor of hosting the 125th Pennsylvania Encampment at the historic Radisson at Lackawanna Station Hotel. Members of the allied orders were treated to special tours of the Lackawanna Historical Society and the GAR Museum as well as a performance during the camp fire and banquet by the Delaney Delacy Cadet Fife and Drum Corps.

It was during the encampment that news was released that Lt. Sweeney had secured the necessary funding, some \$350,000 in all, to restore the massive Soldiers and Sailors Monument on Lackawanna County Courthouse Square. Work on the project is set to begin this year with a planned completion date of 2007.

Later in the month members of the camp, including former Camp Commander Howard Wolfe, Joseph Long Jr. and members of the SVR traveled to Towanda to assist in the rededication of GAR graves at the old Wyoming County Home site outside

Towanda. During the day, the Department also presented the charter to the Pvt. Silas Gore Camp #141 in Towanda.

That same day, on July 23rd, Camp #8, Auxiliary #10 and the Delaney Delacy Guard conducted a family picnic on the shore of Crystal Lake at Elkview Country Club in Carbondale. Guests of honor were Department Commander Eric Schmincke and Ross Camp Members John and John McNulty. A great cook-out was had by all.

Also during the summer representatives of the Camp, including Commander Wolf and Treasurer Long joined the Delaney Delacy Guard at the rededication ceremonies for two Civil War cannons returned to the park in Summit Hill.

Plymouth Pennsylvania 1869. The Civil War had been over for more than four years. Many of the soldiers who fought in that war returned to work in the coal fields of Northeastern PA. On Monday, September 6th, was the worst disaster in the history of Anthracite mining history. The breaker was built right over the shaft, the only way in or out of the mine. About 9:45 a fire broke out in the mine and it was swept up the shaft by the ventilating fan. The breaker, and all the

supports in the shaft were made of wood. They burned and fell into the shaft, trapping all the miners. One hundred and ten men and boys died in that mine. Many were veterans of the Civil War.

Today almost nothing of that mine still exists even though it was rebuilt and continued to operate until the early 20th century. In recent years citizens of the area have been trying to preserve the area. And on September 10, 2005, they held a remembrance/ memorial service for those who lost their lives there.

Members of Lt Ezra Griffin, Camp #8 and the Delany Delacy Guard were on hand to honor our the veterans who lost their lives there. A flag ceremony, a rifle salute and taps were played by members of the Guard.

Many of those who attended were surprised to learn that there were Civil War veterans that had worked in the mine. For many it was the first time they had seen a uniform from that time period.

commit to a third term; even though the State Constitution allows only two. The war has ended and our nation will see many changes. Therefore, we can change our Constitution; but we could not change our governor's mind. He is ready to return home to Bellefonte and be with his family — **NO THIRD TERM.**

Rumor has it that President Grant will name him Ambassador to Russia. The Camp appreciated the Governor's ample time he provided to them. It was an honor to have him among us. The Camp also appreciated its junior member's John Paul and Josemaria Heil for making the campaign posters.

Our year ends with the December meeting on the 22nd. Our website is



Local Woman Donates Letters Telling Grandfather's Story of Civil War

Handwritten words of Oscar L. Severson call across the generations with touching substance:

Civil War era messages from Rev. Severson were donated by his granddaughter to the Grand Army of the Republic Memorial Association of Scranton. Documents will be housed at the association's museum on the 2nd floor of the GAR building at Penn Avenue and Linden Street.

During an informal ceremony at her Lake Sheridan-area residence, Jane Spangenberg, 94, turned the documents over to Joseph Long, Jr. of Duryea, president of the GAR Memorial Association.

Rev. Severson enlisted in the 137th Regiment of the New York volunteers in August 1862 as a 17-year-old and saw action in the battles of Chancellorsville, VA in early May 1863,

Gettysburg, PA in July 1863 and Lookout Mountain, TN in November 1863.

He was wounded in the battle of Wauhatchie, TN in October 1863. After the war, he became a Methodist minister and lived in Scranton for a period when was pastor at Simpson Methodist Church. He died at age 78 in 1924 and is buried at the Dunmore Cemetery.

Documents will be the first Civil War-era letters

in the collection at the GAR museum.

The letters sat in an attic for decades before Fay King of South Abington Township, a daughter of Mrs. Spangenberg, discovered them about 40 years ago.

Approximate values of the letters are about \$100 a piece or more. The historical value of Rev. Severson's papers though is undisputed.

Camp #1- Philadelphia

This past November, Anna M. Ross Camp #1 SUVCW conducted its annual trek to Gettysburg for Remembrance Day. Since the majority of our members are also enrolled with Company C, 28th Pennsylvania Infantry, we conducted a series of ceremonies to honor the 28th.

We started our day down at Spangler's Spring where we formed the company.

We marched from there down around the base of Culp's Hill to an infrequently visited monument along Rock Creek. It is in the shape of a knapsack and honors the 28th's role as skirmishers for the 12th

It was a busy day for Camp #1 and Co. C, 28th PVI, but as always, we persevered and honored those who went before us.

ANCESTOR CLAIMS MEDAL FOR LOCAL CIVIL WAR VET

Robert Trowbridge of White Township claimed a bronze medal engraved with the name Cincinnatus B. Blake. For 139 years it had been left unclaimed in West Virginia, sharing space with thousands of other awards that never found their owners.

In October 2005, Blake's medal recognizing him for services during the Civil War found a home with Trowbridge, Blake's first cousin, four times removed.

In 1866, West Virginia minted 26,099 medals to honor soldiers who fought for the state during the war. Many of the medals never made it to the owners because the state couldn't establish contact with many of the soldiers.

Blake was born on January 8, 1830 in Gallia County, Ohio to Anselm and Hannah (Trowbridge) Blake. Blake crossed state lines to enlist in the 4th West Virginia

Volunteer infantry in July 1861.

He advanced in the ranks to first lieutenant and fought in Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee and

Louisiana. After being discharged on account of disability in 1863, Blake became sheriff of Gallia County and died in 1918 as one of the oldest men in the county.

Slovan Welcomes Home

Army Staff Sgt. Chris Sedlak

U.S. Army Staff Sgt. Chris Sedlak of the 600 Transportation Company Reserve was greeted by friends and family in Slovan after spending a year in Iraq. He is a 12-year veteran and Reservist of the 600 Transportation Company which was based 30 miles north of Baghdad and hauled more than 24 million gallons of bulk fuel throughout the Theater of Operations from LSA Anaconda in Balad.

Many of his comrades paid the price in Iraq and more than 20 received the Purple Heart. At his homecoming reception, he was surrounded by friends and family at the Slovan Veterans of Foreign Wars building. The honored guests of the reception included WW2 Veteran Joe Lanczak, Veteran and Persian Gulf War veterans, Iraq veterans from the 600th including Bronze star recipient SSG Anthony Critser.

Sedlak received the Army Commendation Medal, the Global War on Terrorism Service and Expeditionary Medals along with other decorations and seven commander's coins.

Sedlak will be returning to his civilian occupation in July as a Pittsburgh police officer.

THOMAS SYLVANUS GRAVE REDEDICATION

The John T. Crawford Camp #43 conducted a grave dedication in Indiana, PA on July 10, 2005. The ceremony rededicated the final resting place of Thomas Sylvanus and two of his comrades. Sylvanus, who was born in China with the name Ching Li, is the only known Chinese veteran listed on U.S. pension rolls and "believed to be the only Chinaman regularly enlisted in the Army during the Rebellion", according to Stephenson's *Indiana County 175th Anniversary History*. We also honored John Harvey who was with the USCT and Frank Donahugh of the 61st PA Infantry. The PA Dept. Commander of the GAR was present during Sylvanus's muster in services nearly one hundred years ago and the Pennsylvania Dept. Commander of the SUVCW, the recognized successor to the G.A.R., Eric J. Schmincke attended this rededication and made the keynote address. A 34 star Flag was presented to the PA Dept. Commander recognizing Sylvanus' term of service.

The ceremony received coverage in the local newspapers as well as the Pittsburgh Post Gazette. The PG article was distributed by the AP and was picked up by news organizations in Los Angeles, California. Commander Richard Essenwein as well as Sec./Treas. Will Radell and Patriotic Instructor Rich Hoover were interviewed by the Fox Network affiliate in Los Angeles.

Camp #43 also conducted Grave Re-dedication services in Punxsutawney, PA this summer. Our headstone replacement project, under the command of GRO Richard Essenwein, has aided in the restoration of two local cemeteries in Armstrong County. This year saw the replacement of twenty Civil War headstones along with the accompanying publicity in local newspapers.

Entire Text of Remembering Heroes

Editor's note: You will notice on Page One of Battlecry of Freedom that this story indicates a continuation onto Page 9. As we had extended camp news to report this edition, we were forced to create a Page 9A for this story. While the beginning of the story is contained on Page One, it is reprinted in its entirety. We regret any confusion.

One hundred years ago, on 7 December 1905, dedication ceremonies were conducted for the Pennsylvania memorial erected by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in the National Cemetery at Andersonville, Georgia.

On 7 December 2005, the 100th Anniversary Commemoration of that historical event was held. The focus was on honoring all 4,987 of the Pennsylvania Civil War Veterans who were imprisoned in the Andersonville Prison; of which 1,849 would die there. The rededication was organized by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Department of Pennsylvania, Gettysburg Camp # 112.

There was a "March of Honor," from Providence Spring, adjacent to the original North Gate entry to the stockade and continued approximately 3/8 miles to the Pennsylvania Monument. Participants carried one or more small Pennsylvania state flags. Each flag carried the name of each of the approximately 200 Pennsylvania regiments represented.

As some of the participants gathered to make the march, the glimpse of their reflections could be seen on the surface of the quiet pool of water originating from the spring. That same source would have sustained life for a number of our ancestors 141 years ago. According to record, perhaps by divine intervention, that water came to the surface during a lightning strike to that site on August 16, 1864.

At 1:00 p.m., under the command of 1st Lt. John Price II, the Sons of Veteran Reserve, "Gettysburg Blues," stepped off leading the procession. Their steps in unison echoed from the pavement of Cemetery Road. Continuous stiff breezes forced the color bearers to lean forward, applying force to the staff as the flags proudly displayed their honor of the occasion.

Arrival at the Pennsylvania Monument was such to provide time to make updated announcements and acknowledgements and to permit the "Ceremony" to begin at 2:00 p.m.; as exactly 100 years before. All in attendance were given a red ribbon depicting the event and an informational 100th Anniversary booklet compiled by Brother Dave Sosnowski, Patriotic Instructor of Gettysburg Camp # 112, S.U.V.C.W.

The initial portion of the ceremonial agenda included the Presentation of the Colors, singing of the National Anthem, the Pledge of Allegiance, and Invocation. Opening comments were delivered by National Park Superintendent, Fred Boyles and Lead Park Ranger, Joan Stibitz of the NPS. The Pennsylvania Monument was then presented by Superintendent Boyles back to the people of Pennsylvania for re-dedication.

Remarks of Commander Eric Schminke, Department of Pennsylvania, unable to attend, were read by Brother Dave Sosnowski, also Patriotic Instructor of the Pennsylvania Department, S.U.V.C.W. It noted, "Today you are here to honor

the men of Pennsylvania and in a greater sense, all those who perished within the prison walls."

The Department of Pennsylvania, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War had special commemorative .999 silver medal badges struck, numbered 1 through 300 for this prestigious event. Mr. Fred Boyles was then called to the podium. On behalf of the Pennsylvania Department, S.U.V.C.W., Commander William Mock, from Bedford County, Pennsylvania presented the Andersonville medal badge (No. 001) to the Superintendent for the National Park Service.

Immediately following, were two very moving and personal speeches from William Mock, Commander and James Michaels, Treasurer, also of Gettysburg Camp # 112. Both had ancestors along with Camp member, Charles George, and others present who were imprisoned at Andersonville.

Commander Mock remarked, "that the sight of the "Colors" being carried from the stockade to the Pennsylvania Monument without one word being sounded would speak louder and more eloquently than anything I could possibly pen or say!"

In a spiritual gesture, Bill took a packet of Pennsylvania soil that had been taken from the grave sites of his ancestors which were imprisoned at Andersonville and spread it at the base of the Pennsylvania Monument. In effect, all would be reunited and become one with their home land.

Brother Michaels said. "It's about the remembering and the caring." "We take things for granted that we shouldn't," he said. "We wouldn't be what we are today without them."

Jim, whose great-grandfather died at Andersonville, is credited as the originator of the idea several years ago to conduct a re-dedication ceremony.

A proclamation signed by the Honorable Edward G. Rendell, Governor of Pennsylvania was read by Brother Jim Lawler of Bradbury Camp # 149. The closing paragraph stated,

"On behalf of all Pennsylvanians, I join with the members of Gettysburg Camp # 112, Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War to honor the native sons from Pennsylvania who fought in the Civil War. May we always remember the brave and selfless deeds of these soldiers and veterans and be thankful for the countless contributions they have made, and continue to make, to ensure our fundamental principles of liberty, security, and justice."

After the proclamation was read, the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Sons of Veteran Reserve, Auxiliary to the S.U.V.C.W., Women's Relief Corps, Ladies of the Grand Army of the Republic, Daughters of Union Veterans and the local Alexander H. Stevens Camp # 78, Sons of Confederate Veterans laid wreaths at the monument.

The atmosphere of tribute to the "spirits of the dust" could be felt throughout the singing of "Amazing Grace." The hymn was followed by the Middle Georgia Honor Guard providing the "firing," and the playing of "Taps." The benediction was held and the "once in a life time" ceremony was concluded.
